## THE LITTLE PASSAGE THAT ALMOST DIDN'T MAKE IT

There are lots of passages I wish were not in the Bible. I like to "enhance" a good story every now and then, but it says in proverbs, "A truthful witness does not deceive, but a false witness pours out lies." Okay, so I'm stuck doing my best to stick to the facts. I really like food. Let's be honest, when it's high sodium/high fat, the more the merrier. Then there are those admonitions against gluttony. I sometimes wish I had a car as nice as my neighbor's, but then there is the whole do not covet section of the Ten Commandments. Yes, there are plenty of passages I wish God had just left on the editing room floor.

But there is one passage that almost ended up on that floor. And

quite honestly it would have made my life a whole lot easier if the faithful folks behind the Bible had just left it there.

Luke describes Jesus hanging on the cross, and as he looks down at the mockers and scoffers he says, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." Few people realize that this particular sentence didn't make it into all of the earliest copies of the Bible. Some of the oldest manuscripts we have simply do not contain that comment by Jesus.

You can understand, of course, why some folks might have been tempted to delete that sentence. If the Christian life is the process of becoming more and more like Jesus, then this is one utterance we might want to push

right off the page. How could Jesus look into the faces of those who called for his death and ask God not to let them have it? More to the point, how am I ever going to get to the point where I might be able to do the same thing?

I am convinced that this sentence was just too scandalous for some of those who were responsible for making the early copies of Luke's gospel. It flies in the face of justice. It flies in the face of God's righteous wrath. It makes a mockery of the whole forgiveness process properly understood: the progression from sorrow to penance through restitution ending in reconciliation. When Jesus asks God to forgive the most unforgiveable act in human history without the slightest expression of repentance on the part of his persecutors—well it must have been just too much for some.

Honestly? I can't blame them. And though I am grateful that there were scribes who had the courage to report Jesus' words

verbatim, I have to admit that my relationships would be so much more manageable without them. I have a hard time thinking of a single sentence in the Bible that raises the bar as high as this one. Forgive them because they don't have a clue what they're doing. Forgive the ones who have willfully hurt you and as of yet haven't shown the slightest remorse. Forgive the people who go out of their way to make your life difficult because hurting you gives them pleasure. If they had the slightest idea of how much they were diminishing their own souls they would never do it. But they don't have the slightest idea. Forgive them anyway.

Forgive your brother-in-law for spouting his nihilistic political beliefs with an in-your-face attitude, knowing full well it drives you crazy. It's not likely that he'll ever get beyond cable news talking points, but forgive him anyway.

Forgive your boss who bends over backward to take all the credit *she* can for all the work *you* do. While you're filling out the paper work for a lateral move within the company, forgive her anyway.

Forgive your father for a lifetime of pointing out the dark cloud looming behind all your silver linings. It just could be that he just can't stop himself. Forgive him anyway.

Forgive your brothers and sisters in Christ for not living up to the high standards we all aspire to in



Jesus Christ. Even when the person sitting next to you in church appears to be more hypocrite than saint, forgive them anyway.

It feels strange. Lots of people can give you the chapter and verse of their favorite Bible passage. How many can give you the citation for the verse they wish had never made into the Bible? (Luke 23:34) But you know, it IS in there. And Jesus did say it. And the last time I checked Jesus isn't just my savior, he's my Lord as well. I know I can't become the man God wants me by only doing the things I want to do or am comfortable with.

And of course there is good news too. The more forgiving a person I become, the more likely I am to be forgiven myself. Jesus said that the measure we use in forgiving others will be the measure God uses in forgiving us. And I want to use as generous a measure as possible because I'm pretty confident I will need a rather generous measure myself. With God's help, if I come close to forgiving others as radically as Jesus forgave others and forgives me—then I think I will have made tremendous strides toward the Kingdom. If we, as a church, could do the same there is very little we couldn't do in the cause of Christ.



And to think, some silly second century editor almost left that sentence out. To think we almost missed the challenge and the chance to become so much more than who we are now!



## STUDY ON GOD'S AMAZING GRACE

If there is one thing that distinguishes Christians, it should be "grace." Yet, our actions and words do not always readily associate us with grace. Recall how Jesus demonstrated grace in his life. Think of His interaction with the adulterous woman, His portrayal of the return of the prodigal son, and His response to the thief on the cross. How can we demonstrate that kind of radical grace? What are the modern-day equivalents of the incidents where radical grace is demonstrated by Jesus? How do we make grace an ingrained part of our daily lives?

The Know and Grow Class is embarking on a 12-week study of **God's amazing grace** starting Sunday, August 30. The study will be in the Adult 1 classroom, between services, 10:00-10:55 a.m. A video based on Philip Yancey's book *What's so Amazing about Grace?* and a study guide by the same title will be used as part of the study. The study guide will be provided in the class. The book itself is not required reading for the class. Biblical passages, as well as modern-day parables, will be part of the class discussion.

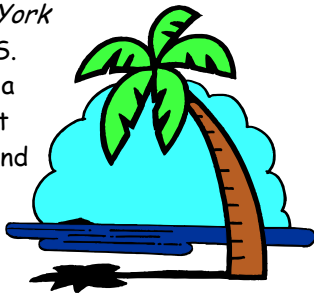
## SUNDAY SCHOOL BEGINS SEPT. 6

will have a time during the September Taizé service to meet your CrossRoads leader that you will be praying for.



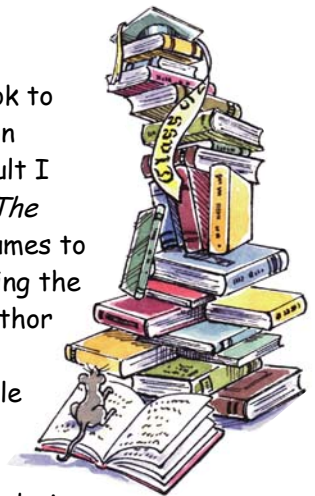

## ECHOES OF THE GOSPEL

*People of the Book*, by Geraldine Brooks is the book to be discussed at St. Andrew's book group meeting on Sunday, September 13, from 6-7:30 p.m. in the Adult I classroom. It chronicles the story of a rare book, *The Haggadah* (one of the earliest Jewish religious volumes to be illuminated with images), which disappeared during the siege of Sarajevo in 1992, after it is found. The author tells a fictionalized version of the history of this precious volume and the people who were responsible for saving it over the years. Reviewers have described it as a thrilling mystery, complex love story, vivid history lesson and celebration of the enduring power of ideas. Brooks is a Pulitzer Prize winning writer.



Please plan to join the group for this book group meeting. "Echoes of the Gospel" is a group that talks about books, applying the lens of their faith and understanding of lessons they learn from the Bible. It is a "drop-in" type group. Some read every book and come to every session. Others attend just when the chosen book is of interest. You are always welcome to enjoy the conversation, whether you have read the book or not. ## InTouch Member of the Month—Lorraine



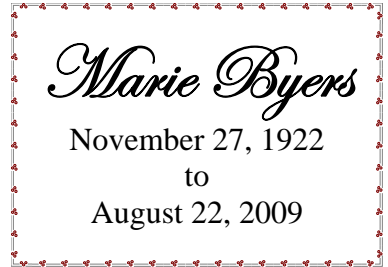

Lorraine has been a member of our congregation since 1970. She currently resides at Westminster Village and is still

active in serving our church. On most weeks, Lorraine is visited by another congregation member who brings her the Sunday bulletins. Together, they spend time putting any inserts in the bulletins and collating them for Sunday mornings. Prior to moving into Westminster, Lorraine volunteered in the church office on a weekly basis.

Lorraine has had a lifelong love of music. She played the viola and taught music appreciation at St. Olaf College in Minnesota, Berea College in Kentucky, and then Purdue University

before retiring. Lorraine was a member of the Lafayette Symphony Orchestra, and she played with the Purdue Symphony Orchestra until she was 96 years old!

Lorraine was quoted as telling another congregation member that, "Because I was never married or had any children of my own, Jesus is my best friend. I would be so lonely without Him in my life." When Lorraine lived independently in her own home, she did not consider it her home but God's home. She always had the spare room made up and ready for any visitors that



God would send to her. Providing hospitality for any of God's children that may come her way was just one of the qualities that Lorraine exemplified in setting a strong Christian example for others. Hey all you cyclists, walkers, runners, yogists, kickboxers, [name your activity], don't forget to exercise your spiritual muscles while you are exercising your body's muscles! Exercising is an OPTIMAL time to talk to God, to pray through your challenges and opportunities, to deepen your walk as you walk, to notice the world around you and praise God for it all. Not sure how? Never really thought about it before? There are lots of ways to get started, and some will work for some and others for others. Two of my favorites are (1) to keep

repeating a scripture verse and then pay attention to what comes to mind. It may just be God wandering around in there! A verse I am especially fond of right now is John 1:1-2: "*In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning.*" (If that's not a muscle bender, I don't know what is!). And (2) look for God around you and tell Him what you see and how you know it's Him and then just



let the joy for Him fill your heart. For example, recently while I was walking, I smiled at everyone I passed, and nearly all of them smiled back. I was struck by how much a smile lights up a face and makes it so beautiful, which triggered another thought about the amazing intricacy and beauty of humans, created in God's (God's!) image, which then made me think of how enormously beautiful God is! Anyway, just a little muscle meditation for your soul . . .
